Metafiction is typically defined as narrative that self-consciously draws attention to its status as fiction. Norwegian metafiction of the 1990s and 2000s has taken a turn toward expressing what I call literary anxiety: an unnerving doubt about whether writing, studying, and/or teaching literature has the capacity to affect everyday life. This dissertation outlines seven metafictional techniques and five types of literary anxiety, all evident in the work of three contemporary Norwegian authors: Hanne Ørstavik, Lars Saabye Christensen, and Dag Solstad. The protagonists of Ørstavik's novels *Uke 43* [Week 43] and *Presten* [The Pastor] undergo crises of language as they realize their inability to convey what they seek to communicate, while the narrator of *kallet-romanen* [The Calling--The Novel] reflects upon the reception of her previous work as she attempts to merge reality and fiction through writing a novel about her grandmother. Lars Saabye Christensen's *Halvbroren* [The Half Brother] and *Saabyes cirkus* [Saabye's Circus] are characterized by creative anxiety, an exposure of the*

creative process using Kierkegaardian recollection, while *Maskeblomstfamilien* [The Turtlehead Family] uses alternate versions to make the reader aware of the author's creative role. Dag Solstad's *Genanse og verdighet* [Shyness and Dignity] and Professor Andersens *natt* [Professor Andersen's Night] feature instructors of literature whose existential breakdowns are initiated by their students' general disinterest in literature. The various manifestations of literary anxiety in these works, expressed by means of a number of often overlapping metafictional techniques, demonstrate a pervasive sense of uncertainty. Ørstavik, Saabye Christensen, and Solstad question the boundaries of literature, the efficacy of language, and even the value of literature itself.
